✦ PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE-BARBARA LEVIN

Welcome to summer! I'm sure it's out there somewhere beyond the May gray. For knitters in most of the rest of the country, it's the time to switch from bulky wools to lighter cottons, linen's and rayon's. We're ahead of that curve in San Diego; those are fibers many of us use year round. Our local yarn stores are bursting with gorgeous new summer yarns (and my MasterCard bill attests that I've researched this topic).

If you are looking for smaller projects to work on in the heat, consider knitting for philanthropy. Hand knit helmet liners are luxuries for troops in Afghanistan's frigid winters, and at least one North Coast knitter will have a family member stationed there next winter. (Simply Google "knitted helmet liners" for the pattern and be sure to use 100% wool, preferably super-wash.) Incongruous as it may seem for summer knitting, there's always a need for scarves...pink ones for breast cancer organizations to auction off, and red ones for heart disease research. ✦ MAY MEETING MINUTES

**North Coast Knitters' Guild
General Membership Meeting
Tuesday, May 5, 2009 - 12:30 p.m.
Barbara Levin presiding
96 members and guests present**

In keeping with our new policy regarding out of town speakers, non members were charged \$5.00 at the door. President Barbara Levin opened the meeting by urging members to sign up for the newsletter on-line. Librarian Nancy Muschek reminded members to return "overdue" books and announced a new and improved checkout system. Eileen Adler passed around a registration sheet for the San Diego Fair. The guild will be sponsoring a demonstration table on June 17, 20, 24 and 26. Colleen Davis reminded members that the June meeting will feature the 2009 Eco-Friendly Challenge. Barbara introduced our guest speaker, Susanna Hansson, who gave a very informative presentation on Bohus Stickning knitting. This unique style of knitting originated on the west coast of Sweden in 1933. Women were forced to become breadwinners because the men of the district had lost their jobs as miners. The governor's wife, a highly educated and progressive minded woman, supported the movement and it soon became the major source of income for most families in the district. Tourists in Sweden often brought home Bohus sweaters as souvenirs. The style became very popular in America and was sold in exclusive stores as "haute couture" garments. These sweaters sold for a great deal of money, with the knitters receiving most of the proceeds. At the height of the movement 800 local women were involved in the state sponsored organization. They all received kits and were given 3 months to complete each project. This labor intensive technique became popular with American knitters in 1985 after an article was published in Vogue Knitting by Elizabeth Zimmermann. As the Swedish economy improved and women found work outside the home, Bohus knitting declined. By 1969 the movement had ended. Susannah displayed several sample sweaters. All were meticulously worked on very small needles featuring complex and colorful designs.

✦ DETAILS ON UPCOMING MEETING... JULY GUEST SPEAKER AND WORKSHOPS!

Program for July 7th: Creating Color Pools with Guest Speaker Brecia Kralovic-Logan. Our Guest Speaker hails from Santa Barbara. She is a fiber artist and will be doing a lecture for us called "Creating Color Pools: An Intuitive Approach to Color for the Fiber Artist".

Workshop- Wed.- July 8th "Knitting With Silk Fabric"
Cost: \$70 for members, and \$90 for non-members. Brecia will lead a 5-hour workshop. Sensuous silk becomes your knitting material and you choose the colors that will make a one of a kind scarf that really stands out - all in one day! You will learn how to tear and join silk strips of fabric for knitting; explore the various textures of different silks, and use dye to create your own luscious colors to knit with. Batches of silk will be dyed in the morning and as they dry you will explore the possibilities of knitting with silk fabric strips. Silk fabric and dyes will be provided.

No homework. Supplies: Bring size 11, 13 and 15 knitting needles and yarns you might like to combine with silk fabric to create a unique knit scarf. Textured yarns in the colors you love are best. Bring at least 6 different choices, and also bring scissors, gloves and an apron.

Workshop- TH.- July 9th "Felt, Stitch, Crochet, Knit"
Cost: \$70 for members, and \$90 for non-members. Brecia will lead this second 5-hour workshop and help participants to expand the range of creative knitting projects by adding in felted wool shapes. This is not using "fulled" wool. Learn a simple way to felt wool roving into sheets that you can cut up to spice up your next one of a kind creation. After felting the wool, embroider the edges in order to pick up stitches and knit or crochet them right in. The wool shapes can be stitched, beaded and embellished to add spark and fun. This technique can be used to create a scarf, a hat or bag--- whatever you imagine!

No homework. Supplies: Bring a variety of yarns in colors and textures you love, a few knitting needles in different sizes, scissors, tapestry needle, crochet hooks in a variety of sizes (embroidery floss and needles, and beads if you have them). A felting kit including floss and roving will be provided.

NEXT YEAR'S FASHION SHOW

Heads Up! Since our April Fashion Show is so popular, get ready for next year's idea. Let's do knitted or crocheted skirts and dresses. Two years ago we showcased skirts but they were not knitted or crocheted. Since then, a lot of clever and cute knitted skirt patterns have surfaced. Come on -- they don't have to be closely fitted -- think of ruffles, tiers, gores, godets, etc. (See the Spring/Summer Vogue Knitting for some cool new ideas!!!)

✦ SHARING AT MAY'S MEETING

We print abbreviated summaries of shared items which provide enough information to allow you to follow up on items you might like to knit. The summaries are prepared using the sharing slips filled out by the participants – who need to put more than their first name down in order for the items to appear in the newsletter. (Now for a quick reminder about sharing rules: If you share an item during the monthly sharing, it cannot be worn in the Holiday Luncheon fashion show. Shared items **MUST BE FINISHED** --- unless it's near Christmas when the rules are relaxed so that you can share an item before it's shipped off to its recipient.)

Eileen Adler: Uccelli, pink 100% wool. This will be featured in the June issue of Yarn Forward.

Lyn Wogsberg: Shawl, Caroline Silk Shawl, multi-colored made of 100% silk yarn.

Thea Lazarevic: Long sleeve sweater- Vogue Fall 1998 pattern in white. Made with Cora-German yarn in 60/40 cotton/poly yarn on #9 needles.

Susan Ludwig: Sweater by Norah Gaughan. Pattern is called Loop in gold. Yarn was Berroco-Seducer. The beauty of this piece is that it is a shell with a light weight cardigan—tied in front. Then it can be untied and the sides dropped to be a long tunic. Adorable!!!

Sara Stolz: Pullover Sweater- Knitting Noro book by Jane Ellison "Chevron Sweater". Made with two colorways of Noro and Silk Garden.

Corrie Dulry: Rose Shapes in bouquet—using crochet and varying colors of pink, using cotton yarns.

Rosie Berkowitz: Red Wool Vest with metal buttons. She knitted it 41 years ago for her son, who was 11 years old at the time.

Ellen Hesterman: Bolero Jacket (asymmetrical), using pattern -Ying Yang with Noro variegated yarn (Silk Garden) with hand painted button.

Cia: Two items... first the Saturday Morning Cardigan in beautiful blues. Pattern was her own she designed for Skacel. Noblesse yarn with Silk and Merino and was knit in different directions. A second cardigan was made using a Gedifra pattern, and the yarn was white cotton from the stash sale. The tailor had to serge off 12" of knitting!

Sandy Yayanos: Sweater based on Bohus Technique. Pattern was from Nicky Epstein's book, *Knitting on Top of the World*. Color-way was Blues with accent colors. Yarn was Andean Silk from Knit Picks—55% superfine alpaca, 23% silk, 22% marino wool, on size 7 Needles.

Sueko Duckwiler: Scarf in purple using one skein of Mirage. 52% Rayon and 48% cotton.

Lisa Limber: Two Items...A Shawl using pattern Mac & Me Babushka, in color-way Tamarind—Alpaca with a twist of Fino. Pattern was seed stitch with lace trim. The second item was an adorable shrug/cardigan using pattern Whisper Cardigan. Color Way was Mary Leaky Schaefer, cabled cotton-sport weight. Unusual construction and done on #3 needles.

✦ SPECIAL EVENTS

San Diego County Fair-

June 12 to July 5 (closed Mondays June 15 & 22)

Entering garments to exhibit in the fair expired on May 6th but many exhibitors brought their garments to the May Guild Meeting to be delivered to the fair on May 27th and 28th, noon to 8:00 pm. Missed the meeting? It's easy to deliver garments: enter the Solano Beach gate entrance of Via de la Valle; drive all the way around to the Pat O'Brien Pavilion Building, park, and walk upstairs; there you will see receiving tables and many helpful folks. When the fair opens, (June 12th through July 5th) you will excitedly look to see how your garment is displayed -- always an adventure and you will see many familiar names as well. Remember to pick up your items on July 6th from noon to 8:00 p.m. but don't leave your information tags at home!

The face of the fair grounds won't look different this year but there are changes going on. For the next three years the "Del Mar Fairgrounds" will be known as the "San Diego County Fair, Presented by Albertsons;" this privilege was purchased for \$1.3 million dollars and will remain in effect for three years. I bet you didn't know that our fairgrounds are the fifth largest in the country and so the names associated with it are important for many reasons.

Albertsons will promote the fair through advertising and in-store promotions and it will offer sponsorships which results in revenue for the fair grounds. This change does not reflect ownership because Albertsons has not *purchased* naming rights; rather it reflects a partnership that could eventually lead to million dollar naming rights in the future. It's not just about the three-week fair but about all the 300 events hosted by the fairgrounds yearly. This year's theme is "**Music Mania**" with some pretty exciting musician headliners including REO Speedwagon, Billy Ray Cyrus, The Temptations, and Barry Manilow. Most of the concerts are included with your daily admission but some do add an additional charge so do check if one of these performers captures your heart.

Their goal is to sell 250 tickets by mid-June but we must do our part. Pre-order your tickets from your favorite local yarn store; they need to know how many blocks of 20 tickets they should purchase.

Why is Stitch N' Pitch important and why does it matter where you buy your ticket? For every ticket sold under the TNNA umbrella, \$1 will go to the Needle Arts Mentoring Program (NAMP), a needle arts mentoring program that works with children from kindergarten through high school in all needle-arts. To date, over 4,000 children have benefited from this program which began in 1997 with at risk students. In the fall of 2002, NAMP joined hands with the *Helping Hands Foundation* which, in the mid-1990's, began Warm Up America! Evie Rosen envisioned getting volunteers nationwide to knit and crochet afghans for people in need and now the program has been expanded with NAMP, developed by Marilyn North and Bonnie Lively. ◆ KNITTING ON THE NET

● GARTER STITCH BABY JACKET

This Debbie Bliss sweater is from her *Baby Cashmerino 2* book. It's written for 3-6, 6-9 and 9-12 month sizes. If you've never knit a sweater, it would be a good first sweater.

● GIRL'S SHRUG

Designed by Martin Storey, this shrug is sized for girls from 3 to 10 years. It was originally printed in *Rowan Classic Family* and is knit on #7 needles at a gauge of 19 st/4 in.

● LACY SUMMER TANK

This simple lace tank is written for bust sizes 32, 36, 40, 44, 48, and 52 inches and uses 425 to 925 yards of yarn. It's knit on #7 needles at a gauge of 17 st/4in. Very little finishing is required – it's knit from the bottom up on circular needles and the shoulders are joined using a 3-needle bind off.

● MONGKOK CARDIGAN

This pattern is written for bust sizes 30, 34, 38, 42, 46, 50, and 54 inches at a gauge of 18 st/4 inches on #6 needles. This is a well written gem – it's knit from the bottom up, uses short rows at the neckline to minimize finishing, has row by row instructions for the short row stairstep shoulder bind offs and includes charts.

● WAVING CHEVRON SCARF

This waving scarf can be knit with any size needles and yarn; the sample is knit on 10 ½ needles with worsted weight yarn.
