from the Meeting on November 3,2015

The meeting was called to order with a welcome to guests and new members.

Liz called on Program Chair Tina Rounsavell who then introduced Jean Degenfelder, a local fiber artist whose specialties are weaving and felting. As part of her program she mentioned that knitters need to be aware of the possibilities of felting artistically. Her program included samples where she used several techniques and a report of her class in felting in Turkey.

After the program, Liz called upon the various chairmen to tell of the activities that are forthcoming. Arlene Shaposhnick, the philanthropy chair, read a thank you letter from a U. S. Marine who was the recipient of a cap made by an NCKG member for Operation Gratitude. She then announced that the next Share a Knit workshop would be November 19 at Coco's Restaurant and will feature a new scarf pattern. Names were drawn from the donor slips of the group for the opportunity drawing.

Liz said that printed items about the Guild and its activities from knitting magazines, newspapers, etc. have been maintained by previous Guild historian Myra Lehmann but we are looking for a successor. Liz will contact Myra to get the box of records.

SDNCKG members were invited to attend the Textile Study Group of San Diego presentation on November 6 in Old Town. The speaker will be Kathryn Harris, a retired professor of fiber arts from San Diego State University. More information was on our own website.

Thea Lazarevic spoke about the various arrangements that are underway for the holiday fashion luncheon and fashion show. She asked that members who have garments to show send their information about the items promptly.

Sue Tavaglione said that no MTM workshops were scheduled until after the start of the new year. She asked for topics and techniques that the members would like to see presented.

June Bartczak said 35 people had already made reservations for the January knitting retreat and that the registration and down payment had to be completed by the end of the meeting. More information about the next retreat in May would be announced in the January meeting.

The library has acquired eight new books. Since there will be no general meeting in December Scarrain said that books on loan should be brought to the January meeting. Membership chair Zita Gardner said that she is able to assist members who would like to connect with others who live nearby, this for transportation sharing and knitting help or company.


Membership

• Whimsy Cowl is a simple, adaptable, fun knit. Ideal for a nice lofty DK or aran yarn, it can also make a great textured piece with more drape when worked in a fingering weight. Pattern is both charted and written and is suitable for adventurous beginners.

Six unexpected **benefits of knitting**. Thanks to Eileen Adler for sending in the article link.

2 <u>Jewel Socks</u>, suitable for men and women. Crossed slip stitches define little ovals of garter stitch, adding interest and texture to a ribbed sock.

6 Knitting with glass: The incredible work of Carol Milne. Thank you to Monica Clark for sharing this story.

4 The Deep Fall 2015 issue of Knitty.com has this gem: Spaziergang mit Emil (<u>"A walk with Emil"</u>)

The halter-style waistcoat is seamlessly worked in garter stitch with no grafting. It is cast on center front and worked flat out to the sides in one piece. Optional bust darts are included and can be added according to cup size.

A newly discovered source for free knitting patterns: <u>All Free Knitting</u> – Free Knitting Patterns for Happy Stitching.

- **Berroco's Kitsap cardigan** is a new design for Fall 2015. It's knit in stockinette stitch and trimmed with an asymmetrical garter st neckband. The bulky yarn and US #10 needles make it a speedy project for most knitters. It is sized for XS through 2X.
- **6** The **Downton Hat** from Annie Cholewa is modeled on a vintage 1915 baby hat and sized for babies through adult. Knit in double moss stitch, it has an invisible rib band inside the reverse stockinette stitch brim, which holds the hat snugly on the head. There is even a video tutorial included in the link.

unknown thick
and thin wool,
with the same
gauge as indicated
for the pattern.
She purchased it
for \$1.00 at the
stash sale and



repurposed the yarn; it was an almost-complete vest. She used the same stitch pattern for the hat.

Barbara Levin modeled Bord de Mer shawl from designer Collete Audrey. She used Shibui Pebble, a silk/Merino/cashmere yarn. It is knit in garter st with a dramatic lace border. The original pattern made a shawl that is 160" long; Barbara's is 90" long x 30" deep.



Ellen Magee used a Cascade yarn of 70% Merino/30% silk for a cabled scarf of her own design. I-cord edging is knit as you go for a very attractive tailored look.



a **bag** made of various upholstery fabrics, which were then edged in reverse stockinette stitch of several yarns, and then applied onto a purse form.

Collen Davis showed

Colleen's duster was the first time she used fingering weight yarns in her own design. She knit rectangles in various yarns on # 8 or 9 needles, and then joined them with bold colors of four different ribbon yarns.







Jan Davis was visiting Manhattan in September when she saw the Glamorous. Fair Isle Hat in the Lion Brand Design Studio and the pattern was free. She knew immediately she had to make it and used Vanna's



glamour yarn to complete the project.



Show & Share November (Check out more photos on Ravelry)

Marilyn McGrath used a 100% viscose rayon yarn called George B Newton from Newton's Yarns to knit this perfect-for-San Diego hoodie. The pattern is from Vogue Knitting Spring/Summer 2014. It incorporates a lace panel in the front and back, and a smaller twisted stitch at the yoke and top of the sleeves. This sweater won Marilyn a blue ribbon at the county fair!



Josephine Barkhousen knit the Metro Coat from Jane Slicer Smith. The summerlong project incorporated her stash of many yarns in shades of olive and teal: Prism, Colinette, eyelash, slubs, wool, etc. The end result is stunning! The pattern is in the book "Swing, Swagger, Drape" and we have it in our Library. For knitters who admire Colleen Davis' work but prefer to knit from a pattern, this is a good place to start.





Mary Barranger knit Confetti Ribs top in Berroco's Boboli Lace yarn. Her notes are on Ravelry. Although she says it is a slightly boring project to knit, she likes the result!



Thea Lazarevic used Summer Cotton yarn (cotton/silk blend) and # 8 and 9 needles to get the desired drape of her Bordered Lace top. The pattern is in "Knitting Pattern Essentials" by Sally Melville. Although Thea said that the pattern instructions could be difficult to follow at times, the end result looks great.

Sydnie Wauson modeled her Vacillate stole. She used wool/nylon and bamboo/ wool yarns to great effect. Her notes are on her Ravelry page. She suggested looking at the projects on Ravelry to see how other knitters adapted the pattern to scarf or cowl sizes, and to gradient and other colored yarns.



Nathine Nelson showed her Amika shawlette. It is designed by Claudia Carlson, a Guild member, and can be made with any yarn. Nathine use her stash to make



this one. More photos and pattern link can be found on **Ravelry**.
