Felting Workshop

Are you afraid of machine felting? Or worried that you will ruin a hand knit piece when you felt it? Come to Mary Ann Archbold's "Felting Class" on Thursday, July 18, 10-1pm, to learn all the elements involved in machine felting.

You will receive a basic purse pattern when you pay for the class. This pattern can be changed in several ways which will be discussed in class to get a unique purse. Other patterns that can be felted will be provided. Use one of these patterns, or a pattern of your choice, and bring the finished knitted piece to class for felting. You will take home your felted piece at the end of the class. If you don't have time to finish a piece before class, there is still much to learn about felting, and

at the end of the class you will go home ready to work on a new project, confident that you have the knowledge to machine felt it.

June Sharing



Mary Barranger knitted a "Sine/ Cosine" top by Ginger Smith, shown in <u>Knitters magazine</u>. Her yarn was Classic Elite Classic Silk in purple.

Lisa Sorensen made an adaptation of a cowl pattern in Knitting Magazine. The yarn is 100% superwash merino from Baah! La Jolla.









Agnes also made a "Miss May" shawl by Marisa Hernandez, published in Maiden Brooklyn. The yarn is 72% viscose, 28% cotton.

Agnes's scarf, "Fine Vine", also from Maiden Brooklyn, is knitted in Jaeger Baby Merino from England.



Linda Gumtz knitted this pullover of her own design in a cotton/ rayon yarn.



Vivian's Dogi vest from Knit Kimono is a good pattern to use a mix of yarns to go with many outfits and use "stash" yarn.



Vivian Forseth knitted Vickie Byram's sock yarn shawl in Ellen's Half Pint Farms wool yarn. The yardage came up one row short of the pattern.



Eileen Adler knitted this orange-amber shell, her original design for Baah! yarns. The Closed Double Wing stitch is usually worked with yarn-over eyelets, but Eileen wanted more definition in the pattern, so she opted to close them using strategically placed increases. The shell is short cropped, quick to knit and can be worn by itself or over a T shirt.







Marie Skillman crocheted a kerchief scarf,"Frango", designed by Claudia Carlson. She used Muench Free Spirit yarn, 100% cotton.



Patt Miller designed a shawl using her own reversible cables and Plymouth Encore wool/acrylic yarn.





Kerry Nare knitted a "Line Break" shawl by Veera Valiwaki of Madelinetosh Merino Light.

Lorraine Meyers knitted a bag, "Night on the Town", by Bev Galeskas, using worsted weight fancy wool yarns.



Toni Wong made a sweater of Noro Nobori in multicolors. She added short sleeves to the pattern and shortened the length.



Ellen Gould knitted an afghan by Nicky Epstein, featured in Vogue Knitting. The yarn is Cascade 220 wool.



These "Infinity Figure Eight" socks were designed by Eileen Adler. "Sometimes it is just fun to play with cables and lace." She used Baah! La Jolla original hand painted sock yarn, one skein in Flamingo Pink. The pattern is available on Ravelry.

From the folks at Purl Soho, comes this classic and easy summer shawl. It's knit on #3 needles and would make a perfect travel project. http://www.purlbee.co



Set In Sleeves

Lots of us add sleeves to sleeveless sweaters....my upper arms haven't been seen in public for at least ten years. Adding the sleeves can be a challenge.



Whoops!

At one point during the June program, my brain and tongue were not coordinated. A careful listener in the audience pointed out, after the program, that I said **incorrectly:**

When transitioning from a garter edge to a stockinette body, you need to decrease the number of sttches.

That's wrong.....to keep both portions the same width, you need to **increase** when you come to the stockinette portion. (And as I pointed out, if the designer of the pattern you're knitting doesn't know this, consider ditching the project --- this may be the first of many technical design errors in the pattern.)

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
