### **Presidents' Letter**

Knitting is such a pleasure. Even making mistakes and ripping are aspects that can give us pleasure. Whether we wear or give the product we can have a sense of satisfaction and accomplishment in ourselves. Many of us have found that a small mindless project is the perfect calming activity for waiting in doctors' offices, on long air flight or car trips. Time passes, and we are able to chat or lose ourselves as we see fit.

Wherever we go we have the chance to visit yarn stores and fiber venues to enrich our craft. Shopping for yarn while traveling near or far or even perusing the Stash Sale bargains gets the creative juices flowing, sensing possibilities, not to mention the pure bliss of the tactile experience. It is very interesting to see what kind of yarn is being carried in various places and how the selection reflects the culture and often the climate. Shops in Singapore will carry a

vastly different stock compared to shops in Norway.

Searching on Ravelry we can find knitters in all corners of the planet. We know that the history of yarn and its making can be found in the farthest reaches of Mongolia or Peru or in our backyard, in the long history of the Native American's, famous for weaving incredible rugs and blankets. We find many ethnic groups expressing individuality in their fiber crafts. We are no different.

While in other countries we can find yarns and fiber intrinsic to the culture and appropriate for the taste and climate, with a global economy we may find fibers coming from Peru in Norway. Alpaca for example is soft, warm and nice to have next to the skin. It can be dyed easily and blended with silk to create an even more luxurious product. In Norway you can find it in shops, as a single fiber, blended with silk or even in forms that would normally be associated with mohair. There are fewer decorative yarns but infinite pallets for Fair Isle or Norwegian classic styles. So like the sea traders of old searching for spices and fine silks, we find products with exotic origins being sold all over.

In the United States we have some of the best stores with wide selections, giving us the full joyous fiber shopping experience. And if that isn't enough, the internet tops it off. The world has become small and with a click of the mouse we can get questions answered about yarns and fiber. Ravelry is a wonderful resource for information, regarding yarns, patterns, and even knit groups all over the United States and the world. Going to South Bend, Indiana or Bakersfield, California? How about Beijing? You will find treasures to explore by searching for people or groups in your travel locations. You can even do a route search on Ravelry to find the yarn shops along your way.

Near or far, we have a path. Creating with sticks and string is a passion. Follow it and let it take you on a wonderful adventure.

October Program: Robin Page: Pagewood Farm Trunk Show

Robin and Chuck Page of Pagewood Farm will be with us on Tuesday, October 14, for a talk about their experience as owners of a company that brings us wonderful, creative and diverse fiber offerings. Robin is the creative force behind Pagewood. She spins yarns incorporating lots of bits of different fibers. She dyes all of the Pagewood yarns and other fibers as well including antique lace and ribbons. She also embellishes yarn and fibers with needle felting and other techniques.

Robin will be sharing some of her yarn embellishing techniques Tuesday morning from 10:00 to 1:00 p.m. The class is now before the Guild meeting. It was originally scheduled from 3:00 to 6:00 pm after the meeting but has been changed to Tuesday morning. #### **November Program**

Our November Program is all about philanthropy. We'll be knitting hats from kits put together by Philanthropy Chair Arlene Shapashnick. We'll hear from Taylor De Vries and Shelley Gerber the founders of Tête-à-Tête Hats, one of the charities supported by Guild knitters. Tête-à-Tête, began in San Diego and provides hats to cancer patients here and all over the U.S.

We'll also hear from Richard Nares, a founder of another local organization. Two years after losing their precious son, Emilio, Richard and Diane Nares started the Emilio Nares Foundation. The goal of the foundation is to assist families with children who are battling childhood leukemia and other forms of childhood cancer. Richard will speak about some of the many ways children and their families are helped: "Ride with Emilio," "Loving-Tabs" Healing t-shirts, which are specially designed for chemo treatments, Patient Advocacy, and family support. Richard was a 2013 top 10 CNN Hero, created to honor individuals making extraordinary contributions to their communities. Gabriela Perez – Vargas, Programs Coordinator for the Foundation, will share stories about teaching parents to knit during the long hours of treatment, with some very positive results.

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## **Update on Guild Retreats**

Our next San Diego North Coast Knitters Retreat is scheduled to begin January 19 at dinner, through lunch January 22, 2015. We currently have 27 members signed up. The address of La Viña de Lestonnac is 39300 De Portola Road, Temecula, CA 92592. Visit their website <a href="https://www.vinadelestonnac.com">www.vinadelestonnac.com</a>.

The knitting room is well-lighted with overhead lights and includes outdoor patio options for knitting. There are sofas and chairs available. More small tables have been promised. The sleeping rooms accommodate a maximum of three people, with two twin-sized beds and one ottoman-pull-out bed. Last year, we had one triple with no complaints! There are all-day kitchen amenities, including hot water for various teas, supplied by La Viña. Breakfast, lunch and dinner are included in the total price which turns out to be the same as it was last year: \$405.00 for a single, \$305.00 for a double, and \$265.00 for a triple.

The deposit is \$100.00 per person, regardless of the type of accommodation. You may pay your deposit at a meeting (until November, 2014) or send it to the Retreat Coordinator: June Bartczak, 157 Via Monte d'Oro, Redondo Beach, CA 90277.

For 2015, our Spring Retreat will be at a new place, Mary & Joseph Retreat Center located at 5300 Crest Road, Rancho Palos Verdes, CA 90275 from May 18 to May 21, 2015. The grounds are lovely, the views are wonderful, there's hiking on the Palos Verdes Peninsula, with trailheads nearby within walking distance, there are three yarn shops within a six mile radius, AND it's about a two hour drive from the San Diego area!! The website address is <a href="https://www.maryjoseph.org">www.maryjoseph.org</a>. Prices for the

three nights and nine meals are \$460.00 per person for a single and \$355.00 per person for a double. As a comparison, last year at La Casa singles cost \$481.50, doubles were \$396.00 and triples were \$340.50. The accommodations are quite similar to those at La Casa, each room having its own bathroom; they are basic,



like at La Casa, with no TV, phone or internet connection.

There are photos on the website which I encourage those interested to visit. There's a communal dining room with some tables outside as well as indoors. There's no pool, but a masseuse is available on site with prior-made reservations, more information for which will be posted in future newsletters. Any questions, you may email or call me.

Deposits of \$150.00 for a single and \$100.00 per person for a double will be accepted beginning in February 2015. Maybe dates at La Casa will mesh with our needs for the following year, we'll see.

## Sara Smelt's Felted Lariat Workshop


Sara Smelt's Felted Lariat Workshop

## **Knit For The Cure 2014**

Staying Alive, written by the Bee Gees for the soundtrack of Saturday Night Fever, was released in December 1977. Decades later, medical associations have found that the song is useful for people administering CPR in emergencies with its steady beat being an excellent means of keeping to the proper compression rate in the procedure. Stayin' Alive, Stayin' Alive - Ah, Ah, Ah, Ah...

With the gift of our hands and the beat of our knitting needles, we can save lives too with Knit for the Cure which was founded in 2004 and has raised over \$50,000 – over \$5,000 was raised just last year. Hundreds of items have been collected here in San Diego and sold at Komen Foundation events across the county, including the Race for the Cure® in San Diego's Balboa Park, which occurs on the first Sunday in November, November 2.

Look through your stash and think about what might be knitted: a hat, scarf, fingerless gloves, a

headband, even shoelaces and Eileen has patterns for you to whet your appetite! 75% of the funds raised from our creations remain here in San Diego to cover every step of the breast health journey – from education, outreach, mammograms, and diagnostics, to surgeries, chemotherapy, radiation and material and financial support like



meals, mortgage payments, child-care, prosthetics, and wigs. The remaining 25% of each dollar raised funds national research to discover the causes of breast cancer and, ultimately, its cures. Every 13 minutes, one woman in the U.S. will lose her life to breast cancer, but women and men diagnosed with early stage breast cancer have a 99 percent survival rate.
