Presidents' Letter



Co-Presidents Stacy and Sheila

How does creativity influence our life and our knitting? Is creativity important to everyone or just those arty types? If we wistfully compare ourselves to others that have the "gift," does that mean we wish we had it to? If so, how can each of us bring more creativity into our knitting and into our lives?

It is interesting to think about what creativity means and how as an artist or craftsman it is reflected in what we do whether it is knitting, painting, sewing or cooking. When perusing an assortment of supplies, yarns, paints, or exotic ingredients, ideas unfiltered and free are great, but as the saying goes, 20% inspiration and 80% perspiration. In any endeavor you have to do the work for anything substantial to happen. So if you are interested in bringing a little more creativity into your knitting (or for that matter your life) what can be done?

Play more! As children we were so excited to see our

first knitted scarf grow. Sometimes it grew sideways and sometimes it narrowed and then there were the holes. Then it might have been a problem. Learning to knit means learning to read your knitting and learning to work the stitches correctly and eventually make a swatch to gauge. We have all heard the advice. Even creative people want the sweater to fit, the painting to work, and the food to be edible.

How do we throw off the chains of reason and allow our imagination to fly free? Taking a workshop from Susan Lazear is a wonderful way to test your wings. Her classes will look at the influence of Asian designers. New ways of looking at simple garments such as turning them upside down will bring you back to the days of "dress up."

Susan's second class, East Meets West, will give you the tools to design your own garments using simple shapes. In painting we call it a limited pallet; with few colors we learn how to make more colors, we are not overwhelmed. Here you will take simple shapes and put them together to make a garment, you won't be concerned with increasing, decreasing and shaping. Putting puzzle pieces together you can come up with your own original ideas.

There is clearly a place for mindless knitting, but there isn't any knitting that doesn't take some thought. So along with our thoughtful and challenging work, we can take a new challenge and bring some play into our knitting. Channel the enthusiasm and excitement you felt when you first learned to make your first stitches. Change needles, use number 35s, use ten yarns all at once, drop stitches, knit two together and don't do a yarn over. Pick up stitches and go sideways, make holes, make mistakes. Then be adventurous: wet it and block it. Pull it this way and that, pin it and let it dry. Hang it on the wall, call it a scarf or call it art. Be inspired and be brave.

Last but definitely not least, bring your experiments to a Guild meeting and let us enjoy your free spirits at show and share. You too can be a creative inspiration to us all. See you then.



Our next San Diego North Coast Knitters Retreat at Viña de Lestonnac Retreat Center in Temecula is scheduled to begin January 19 at dinner and go through lunch on January 22, 2015. We currently have nine members signed up. Last year, we had members taking pictures of the food!! For good reason!! Of course, there's the knitting camaraderie to enjoy, as well!!

The deposit this year is \$100.00 per person, regardless of the type of accommodation. Full prices are not yet available, but will be quoted in future newsletters. The knitting room is well-lighted with overhead lights and includes outdoor patio options for knitting. There are sofas and chairs available. More small tables have been promised.
