



FEBRUARY 2: Kerianne Quick Unravel It: Finding Meaning Through Materials

Join us at the February meeting when award-winning artist and researcher Kerianne Quick shows us how the source of her material influences her craft. She'll describe her ongoing project using the fleece of an unusual flock of sheep from the island of North Ronaldsay, the northernmost of the Orkney



Kerianne will describe her travels to the island, the unusual farming practices of the crofters and the milling process on the island. How will the project end up? She's not sure yet, but we'll hear about the possibilities she's considering.

Kerianne Quick is currently Assistant Professor of Jewelry and Metalwork at San Diego State University. She mixes traditional and digital craft processes with ethnographic and sociological research to explore craft, materials and culture and to consider how an object can contain meaning.

Kerianne's work is included in major collections such as the Houston Museum of Fine Arts and the Stedelijk Museum in 's-Hertogenbosch, the Netherlands. It has been exhibited at the Museo Franz Mayer in Mexico City, the Salon del Mobile in Milan, and Design Week Amsterdam. To learn more, visit her website.

different this month. They will be teaching three workshops before our Tuesday meeting March 1.

Monday, February 29, they will teach "The Scharves: New Perspectives on Shawl and Scarf Knitting." In order to give more people have a chance to take this workshop, it will be offered twice, from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm and then from 2:00 pm to 5:00 pm.

Tuesday, March 1, before the meeting, Stephen & Steven will teach "Mix Your Six: A Game of Modifications" from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon. The cost for each workshop is \$45.

Because we want as many people as possible to have a chance to take one of their workshops, we are only taking sign-ups from current members whose dues for 2016 have been paid. Members can only take one workshop. Stephen & Steven limit the workshops to 22 students. If more than 22 people sign up for a workshop, we'll randomly draw 22 names from the list of sign-ups for that class.

What are we making? We are knitting Knitted Knockers.

What are Knitted Knockers? Knitted Knockers are a light comfortable knitted prosthetic alternative for

women who have had a mastectomy. When placed in a bra, these knitted breasts take the shape and feel of a real breast.



They are lighter and more comfortable than silicone prosthetic breasts.

This **website** includes patterns and a three-part video on how to construct these.

What supplies will I need?

- ✓ NEEDLES: 1 set of double point needles in US 4, 5, or 6 that are at least 6" long.
- ✓ YARN: (about 50 yards of any of these suggested yarns makes one Knitted Knocker)
 - Skacel CoBaSi DK by HiKoo (55% Cotton, 21% Nylon (Polyamide), 16% Bamboo, 8% Silk)
 - Sublime Egyptian DK (100% cotton)
 - Tahki Cotton Classic "Light" (100% mercerized cotton)
 - Cascade Yarns Ultra Pima Fine, sport weight 100% cotton or Ultra Pima, DK
- ✓ NOTIONS: stitch marker to mark needle 1 tapestry needle.

What skills will I learn?

Working on dpn (double pointed needles) Knitting an I-Cord

Kfb – increase - knit next stitch in the front and back K2tog – decrease - knit the next 2 stitches together SSK – decrease – slip, slip knit

Rosebud closure or threaded closure

Philenthropy



Colleen founded the Guild along with Phyllis Bates in 1996 and she served as President for 10 years. Colleen presented "To Boldly Knit," her list of inspiring ideas for creative new ways to knit. She presented a fashion show of sweaters illustrating her exploration of color, texture, shapes, short rows and more. The designs were thrilling to see and the audience had plenty of questions. The business meeting followed. Tina explained the procedure to sign up for March workshops with Stephen West and StevenBe. Members must be current to sign up and may only attend one workshop. Additional instructions are on the website and in the February newsletter. Zita Gardner explained that membership fees are due again. The cost is \$25, payable in cash or check to SDNCKG. No payments will be accepted without a form. In order to be in the directory, payment and forms are due by the March meeting. Members will receive a new password for the newsletter and the old password (Ilovetoknit) will be obsolete.

Eileen Adler invited members to Share a Knit on March 10. The project is Knitted Knockers, which are hand knit or crocheted breast prostheses for mastectomy patients. Liz reported that we still have vacant board positions: Philanthropy, Stash Sale, and Holiday Luncheon coordinators. She urged members to volunteer, as these are terms of only one year.

To Boldly Knit

Colleen kindly shared her list from January's program. What does "To Boldly Knit" mean? Could it mean...

- 1. Making your own design
- 2. Using an unusual color combination
- 3. Trying 50 yarns
- 4. Knitting one sleeve different from the other one raglan, one set-in
- 5. Knitting one sleeve vertically, one horizontally
- 6. Knitting each sleeve a different length
- 7. Knitting one side of a garment horizontally, one vertically
- 8. Using more than one yarn
- 9. Mixing different fibers together –cotton, silk, alpaca, wool, rayon, etc
- 10. Building a garment or shawl in parts
- 11. Trying an asymmetrical style
- 12. Trying color gradation
- 13. Trying a new silhouette
- 14. Using your geometry skills
- 15. Building confidence to try something new
- 16. Trying fingering yarn or sock yarn with big needles
- 17. Mixing bulky yarns with medium-weight yarns
- 18. Minimizing the importance of gauge and row counts
- 19. Mixing plain yarns with multicolored ones
- 20. Combining different textures or stitch patterns
- 21. Trying a freeform or free-wheeling technique going in different directions
- 22. Using great buttons as your starting point
- 23. Using fabric or carpeting or paint swatches as an inspiration for a design
- 24. Knocking off a design from the boutique or store or magazine or friend
- 25. Forgetting some of the RULES lightening up!

Elizabeth Primrose-Smith introduced Joris, her stuffed animal from designer Annita Wilschut. Elizabeth used Misti Alpaca, a blend of alpaca and silk. What she learned from making this is to use smaller needles and stuff the toy as you go along.



Susan Schock was inspired by last year's guest speaker Grace Akhrem, who designed the Riverbed Shawlette. Susan used Baah! Yarns' Savannah (Merino/Cashmere/Nylon) in the Pacific Beach Blues colorway. A fine result for her first shawl; well done, Susan.





Liz Knapp knit Wasabi the Whale using Knit Picks Brava Bulky acrylic yarn in the Celestial colorway. She got the large safety eyes from Amazon.com. This is an easy pattern for a first-time stuffed toy knitter. Liz's project notes are on Ravelry.

Diane Seaberg knit her Urban Chic stole/scarf in alpaca lace yarn from a store in McMinnville, OR. She found the pattern easy; you only have to think about what you're doing on every 24th row. The pattern is from Dan Doh designer Yumiko Alexander.



Stacy Smith ignored El Nino weather as she crocheted this grand stash buster of a bedspread. She used a size U hook and all types of yarns from her stash. Can you believe it took her only a few weeks to complete?



Sydnie Wauson knit the Canis Majoris shawl in Brown Sheep Wildfoote Luxury Sock yarn. She got the yarn at the stash sale and added beads from a shop in Palm Springs. Her project notes are on Ravelry.



Zita Gardner modeled her Seamless Yoke
Sweater. This Elizabeth Zimmerman design uses math and percentages based on your "key number," which is based on your gauge and your desired finished bust measurement. Zita used Berroco Softwist rayon/wool yarn. Look closely and you will also see

Zita's **Moonrise Necklace**, a Sivia Harding kit with beads.
