OCTOBER 4: Linda Hart, "How Knitting Changes Lives"

Twelve years ago, a shy mother at Linda Hart's children's school asked her, "Will you teach me to knit?" This simple, hesitant question changed Linda's life. Teaching this one woman to knit led to Linda being asked to lead the Closely Knit group at the Solana Beach library, and her experiences in this group led her to write her book, *Closely Knit*, published in 2014. The group has been meeting



for 12 years and now has 200 members. Recently, Closely Knit members encouraged her to publish her first original design: the Weaverly Scarf.

A Guild member and retired psychologist, Linda is looking forward to sharing what she has learned from leading this group and writing her book. She'll focus on the importance of our knitting friendships and stories. She will also tell us how to maximize the health benefits of our knitting, based on the latest research she has studied. NOVEMBER 1 : Carson Demers, "Bringing Comfort Back to Knitting: My Ergonomic Journey"

By day, Carson is a physical therapist who runs an ergonomics program for a San Francisco Bay Area medical center. Every other moment, he's knitting, spinning, designing, teaching, writing, or otherwise up to some fiber fun with a watchful eye toward ergonomics. His passion and experience in fiber arts combine with his expertise in physical therapy and ergonomics to create a unique skill set that he eagerly shares with the fiber

community at local yarn shops, guilds, and major knitting events across the country. He is a regular contributor to Ply magazine. His aim is to keep us all creating healthfully and comfortably ever after. Carson will offer four workshops while he's here.



Wednesday morning, November 2, he will teach **"Knitting Happily Ever After:**

Ergonomics for Knitters." Learn how your knitting technique affects your body and how some simple changes can keep you knitting comfortably and safely ever after.

Wednesday afternoon Carson will offer **"Swatchbuckling."** Bring improved ergonomics to life in your knitting technique. You'll swatch to improve your posture, comfort and efficiency and look at ways to add movement to knitting to avoid stiffness and injuries caused by disuse.

Thursday morning, November 3, he will present **"KnittRX."** Tired muscles, sore joints, and aching backs and necks needlessly plague too many knitters. This class will teach you fun ways of "fiber care" for the most important project you make—YOU!

Thursday afternoon is **"Ergonomics for Fiber Enthusiasts."** Do you do more than knit or spin? This class takes inventory of the ergonomic pros and cons for a variety of fiber arts including weaving and finer needle work. You'll learn to identify ergonomic risk in your craft and discover techniques to prevent injuries, including improved posture, stretching and exercise.

All workshops will be held at San Dieguito United

Methodist Church, 170 Calle Magdalena, Encinitas. Morning workshops are from 9 am to 12 noon. Afternoon workshops are from 1 pm to 4 pm. Watch our website and your e-mail for information about homework, supplies and handouts.

Share-A-Knit

Our last SAK gathering for this year will be on Thursday, October 20 from 9:30 am to 12 noon at the Solana Beach Library (157 Stevens Avenue, Solana Beach; please park in the lower parking lot.). This SAK event will be very different from all of the others because we are going to focus on the "garden" in Sarah's Garden Scarf. We'll learn four embroidery stitches: Spider Web Flower, Lazy Daisy, French Knot, and the Stem Stitch. **Please start your scarf and knit 8" or more in length BEFORE THE SAK SESSION**. Bring along oddments of "flower" colors and green for the stem and a tapestry needle that will easily accommodate the yarn you are working with. Sarah's Garden Scarf

MATERIALS: YARN: 200 to 250 yards of knitting worsted weight yarn

NEEDLES: US 10 (6mm) needles

NOTIONS: tapestry needle

SIZE: 5" wide and between 50" and 60" long GAUGE: about 18 sts + 24 rows = 4" but gauge isn't critical for this pattern

Sarah's Garden Scarf is a multiple of 6 sts + 3 (+ 2 selvage stitches)

Cast on 23 stitches – all slipped stitches are slipped purlwise with yarn in back


Rows 1 and 3: k1, *slip 1, k1, slip 1, p3* repeat to last 4 sts: slip 1, k1, slip 1, k1

Row 2: k1, p3, *k3, p3* repeat from * to last stitch: k1 Row 4: k1, purl to last stitch, end k1

Rows 5 and 7: k1, *p3, slip 1, k1, slip 1* repeat to last 4 sts: p3, k1

Row 6: k4, *p3, k3* repeat to last stitch, k1 Row 8: k1, purl to last stitch, end k1 Repeat Rows 1 to 8 for pattern.

End on Row 4 or Row 8. Bind off.



Repeat these 6 sts

Take a Workshop and Help the Guild

Our Guild spends a big part of its budget on programs. Most members understand that the Guild pays for programs with membership fees and our two big fundraisers, the Stash Sale and the Holiday Luncheon. The third big source of income for programming is the fees we charge for workshops. The workshop fees go to the Guild, not to the teachers. The teachers charge us a flat fee for each day of teaching. Whether five people sign up for a workshop or 20 do, our cost is the same.

When workshops are full, as for Stephen West and StevenBe, the fees cover the whole cost of the workshops and some of our other expenses as well. We provide airfare, a hotel room, meals, and local



transportation for all of our out-of- town speakers, and we pay the church for the use of the classroom. Each out-of- town speaker costs the Guild around \$2700.

So if you're hesitating about signing up for a workshop, you have two good excuses. First, Guild workshops are a bargain compared to Stitches, Vogue Knitting Live, and other knitting events. Teachers like Carson Demers bring us the same classes they teach at those events. Because the Guild subsidizes the cost, you pay around \$30 per workshop instead of nearly \$100 (plus the cost of your plane tickets and a hotel room). Second, when you sign up for a workshop, you're helping our Guild pay for the wonderful speakers we enjoy.

Carson Demers' workshops in November will be your last chance in 2016 to take a Guild workshop. He's offering two of the same workshops he'll be teaching at Stitches West in February, plus two more not available at Stitches. Consider signing up. You'll not only have a great time learning more about our craft, you'll be helping our Guild.

Retreat Update

We now have 14 members signed up for our Guild Retreat at Vina de Lestonnac Retreat Center in Temecula. The event begins with dinner on Monday, January 16, 2017 and goes through breakfast on Thursday, the 19th of January. The total cost is \$422.00 for a single room, \$322.00 each for a double room and \$292.00 each for a triple. This includes all meals as noted above. To hold your spot, please send your non-refundable deposit check made out to SDNCKG to June Bartczak, Retreat Coordinator, 157 Via Monte d'Oro, Redondo Beach, CA 90277. The total costs are the same as last year, as are the deposits: \$150.00 for a single, \$100.00 per person for a double and \$75.00 per person for a triple.

There are all-day kitchen amenities, including a coffee machine, hot water for the various teas supplied by the Retreat Center. The knitting room is well-lit with overhead lights and includes outdoor patio options for knitting. There are sofas and chairs available, as well as conference chairs.

Vina de Lestonnac Retreat Center is located at 39300 De Portola Rd., Temecula, CA 92491, among the vineyards in the heart of the Temecula Valley wine country. 

has to add eyes and a mouth, yet she had us all laughing at the great use of eyelash yarn for the hair.





① <u>Owl Sweater & Hat</u> for newborn to 18mos., knit in DK weight cotton.

⁽²⁾ Knitted Woodland Superheroes from Willow Yarns can be knit with any weight yarn to create different size toys. Just use a needle 2 sizes smaller than usual for that yarn.

③ <u>**Retro Waves Shawl**</u> from Drops Design uses bulky self-striping yarn and is loosely knit on #10.5 needles. The artful curves are formed by short rows.







④ The elegant **Escargot Hat** is a free pattern on from **Knitty.com**. It is knit in one piece, from the brim to the top. It reminds me of the Roaring Twenties.

^⑤ Better Dorm Boots are the perfect gift for everyone. Knit <u>plain</u> or with a bit of chunky <u>lace</u>, you will find plenty to like about this project. It is a speedy knit on large needles, knit flat then seamed.

⁽⁶⁾ The <u>Brick Pullover</u> is a classic raglan sweater that can be customized with stripes, a colorblock design, stitch patterns, sleeve length, and more. See the many projects completed by other knitters and find inspiration to knit your own.

⑦ The <u>Hollenhorst Scarf</u> can be knit out of almost any weight yarn and is suitable for men and women. It is the perfect project that requires just enough concentration to keep it interesting, but not so much counting that you can't talk or watch TV while knitting it. It is a good choice for our charities too.

✓ Great article from Knitting Daily with <u>Yardage</u> <u>Estimates</u> for Sweaters in Standard Yarn Weights (fingering, sport, worsted, bulky)

✓ In this story from the Financial Times, read about the origin of the **Fair Isle Jumper** (aka, pullover sweater). Lots of British terminology and spelling, and a good reason for a vacation.
