from the Meeting on July 5, 2016

President Liz Knapp welcomed visitors and members to start the meeting. The Program Chair, Tina Rounsavell, announced that former member Ellen Hesterman had left a donation to the Guild in her will. Those who had knitted items that reflect Ellen's joy for bright color combinations were encouraged to participate in the August fashion show in her honor. It is necessary that the committee have a head count for the desserts that will be served. Sign-ups were encouraged as early as possible. Tina then introduced Karen des Jardins who showed tools and gadgets to aid knitters and had many suggestions for making the knitting easier and better.

After the presentation, Liz conducted the business portion of the meeting. She called upon several chair persons who had plans for guild activities:

- 1. Stash sale yarns for the fall sale will be accepted by Chair Lynn Koch at Yarning for You, at the next meeting, or by special arrangement with Lynn via phone. The last date for donations is August 5.
- 2. Janet White had yarn and pattern kits for making projects for several charities. She said the need for these demanded that the garments be turned in by the November meeting in order to be of use to the recipients. She asked for a volunteer to assist with helmet liners for Operation Gratitude, and mentioned that the liners are an excellent project for "social knitting."
- 3. Eileen Adler listed future dates for Share-a-Knit sessions: Sept. 14 and Oct. 21. The July 27 Members-Teaching-Members class will be devoted to making yarn bracelets at the home of Peggy Redler.
- 4. Carol Myers thanked those who participated in the demonstrations at the recent San Diego Fair. These members showed completed works as well as answering questions about knitting and the Guild activities. Two prizes were awarded by the Guild.
- 5. June Bartczak said she would welcome thoughts about retreat sites and activities so she could make reservations for future Knitting Retreats.

Liz Knapp then asked for volunteers for the nominating committee since all elected members will be "termed out" at the end of the year. Participants are asked to call Liz soon. The meeting was then turned over to Linda Erlich who led the Show and Share Session.

Retreat Update

Our next Guild Retreat at Vina de Lestonnac Retreat Center in Temecula is scheduled to begin with dinner on Monday, January 16, 2017 and go through lunch on Thursday, the 19th of January. The total cost is \$405.00 for a single room, \$305.00 each for a double room and \$265.00 each for a triple. This includes all meals as noted above. To hold your spot, please send your non-refundable deposit check made out to SDNCKG to June Bartczak, Retreat Coordinator, 157 Via Monte d'Oro, Redondo Beach, CA 90277. The total costs are the same as last year, as are the deposits: \$150.00 for a single, \$100.00 per person for a double and \$75.00 per person for a triple.

There are all-day kitchen amenities, including a coffee machine, hot water for the various teas supplied by the Retreat Center. The knitting room is well-lit with overhead lights and includes outdoor patio options for knitting. There are sofas and chairs available, as well as conference chairs.

Vina de Lestonnac Retreat Center is located at 39300 De Portola Rd., Temecula, CA 92491, among the vineyards in the heart of the Temecula Valley wine country. TKGA News

Since 2001 The Knitting Guild Association (TKGA) has been owned and managed by Offinger Management Company (OMC), an association management company. In April of this year, OMC decided to dissolve TKGA, but they were willing to turn the entire organization over to the Master Hand Knitting Committee. The Committee unanimously decided that we could not let TKGA and its programs die. Since that time we have worked to establish TKGA as a non-profit entity with a board and bylaws. The transition from OMC's management to our independent operation will be complete by October 31st.

Just like the Master Hand Knitting Committee, all of the Board members are donating their expertise and time as volunteers without any compensation.

Although we will be starting from the ground up as a new organization, we will honor existing memberships and the current educational programs and certification programs will not change. The only exception is the Master Machine Knitting Program. From this date, no new candidates will be allowed to purchase the program. Only those currently enrolled will be able to attain Masters status. The Master Hand Knitting Program will stay the same, and if you are currently enrolled your records and payments will transfer to the new organization. The same is true for those enrolled in any of the correspondence courses.

The major area of change will be *Cast On* magazine. The Fall 2016 issue will be the last print edition. The financial realities of producing the magazine contributed to Offinger's decision to not continue with the organization. We will continue to produce Cast On but the new version will be digital only, and the educational component will be expanded. Expect articles and patterns to enhance your skill set as well as the fashion forward designs you have come to expect. We will also produce a monthly newsletter filled with tips, reviews and, occasionally, free patterns.

We are looking forward to a streamlined organization that is better designed to meet your knitting education needs. Please be patient during this transition time. We will continue to update you on programs, educational opportunities and membership as those decisions are made. 

Barbara Wright knit the Timeless Henley pullover in Walk Co. Cozy Merino. Because it is a light fingering weight yarn knit at a loose gauge, this Joji Locatelli pattern makes a comfortable garment for our climate. The sweater is knit top-down in one piece – no seams!

published in June 2011 Knit 'n Style magazine. Worked in Great Adirondack Yarn Co. Smoochie yarn (85% superwash Merino/15% metallic), the effect is stunning. Check out Nathine's **Ravelry page** for details.

Jill Zagami used China Blue yarn (60% wool/40% acrylic) and a Debbie O'Neill pattern to knit her lovely **Second Story Tee**.



Nathine's second shawl is a crocheted one called Alpine Shawl from designer Cristina Mershon. Nathine used Cascade Ultra Pima cotton yarn. The free pattern is available here.





Linda Erlich wowed us with the **Lamina Wrap** from designer Ambah O'Brien. The project used many colors of fingering weight merino. What a great use of leftover sock yarn!



Nathine's third is the Ventura Shawl from Zsuzsanna Makai. This pattern is from Summer 2016 Interweave Crochet. It is made is Cascade Tangier, a blend of silk, viscose, acrylic, cotton and spandex.



The other shawl (below) is a modified version of the Aranami Shawl by Ola Buraya-Kefelian. Rachel used up scraps of fingering weight yarn from her own stash and that of her knitting friends.





Susan Schock purchased yarn from Lorna Miser at a Guild meeting, and then knit the Stone Croft Shawl by Judy Marples to match her mosaic sweater from a few years back. Susan chose this pattern because it allowed her to adjust the size of the shawl to the amount of yarn she had.

- Elann.com brings us the **Diagonal Garter Square Shawl**. Knit diagonally to its center, and then split in two, it is completely reversible, and it can be knit in any yarn to any gauge. The **pattern is free** this month.
- **2** The <u>Mesh Panel Pullover</u> is worked in one piece from the bottom front up and over the shoulders to the bottom back. A mesh panel spans from cuff to cuff. Free from Classic Elite Yarns.
- **3** Shawl May-nia is a <u>free eBook</u> with ten shawl patterns, including Una, pictured here. Classic Elite Yarns offers a free download on Ravelry.

◆ The TNNA Cardi is worked from the top down in pieces and seamed. It was designed for the summer 2016 TNNA show and looks fantastic on people of all shapes and sizes. Free pattern courtesy of Universal Yarn.

- **⑤** The <u>Little Peep Dress</u> pattern is written for sizes 3 to 24 months. Knit this for the special little girl in your life.
- **6** A trio of <u>Summer Leaves Cloths</u> from Universal Yarns make lovely hostess or baby shower gifts. Knit in cotton, they are quick and portable projects for the adventurous beginner knitter.
- ✓ A British TV Network ran knitted versions of well-known UK spots for an entire commercial break. Take a look here.
- ✓ Do you hate sewing in your ends? Learn a new way to weave in ends as you knit in the article from KnittingDaliy.com.
