MAY 3: Patty Lyons "Oops I Accidently Knit a Dress: Tales of Lies, Denial and Heartbreak"

let down, we feel tricked, and we feel lied to . . . by our gauge swatch. Find out how to make your gauge swatch tell you the truth. In this funny and informative visual presentation Patty Lyons will take us from gauge tragedy to triumph. Never be a gauge victim again! Patty Lyons is a nationally



recognized knitting teacher and technique expert who is known for teaching the "why"--not just the "how." She specializes in sweater design and sharing her love of the much-maligned subjects of gauge and blocking. Patty teaches at guilds and knitting shows around the country, and her popular classes can also be found online at Interweave, Annie's and Craftsy, where her "Improve Your Knitting Class" was named Craftsy's most popular class of 2013. Patty is excited about her newest DVDs with Interweave: "Knitting Bag of Tricks," "Advanced Fixes in Knitting" and "An Introduction to Color Knitting."

Patty's designs and knitting skill articles have been widely published in knitting magazines, and her designs have also been included in pattern collections from Classic Elite, Noro, Cascade, Tahki Stacy Charles and Kollage Yarns.

She has worked with Mary Engelbreit, and her work has been published in several of Engelbreit's books. Mar Gee was featured in Home Companion Magazine and Mary Emmerling's Country Home Program on HGTV.

Mar Gee owned a garden shop for 15 years before moving to California with her husband in 2002. She joined the SDNCKG in

2007 and has been involved in various Board and committee positions ever since. She served as Guild president in 2011 and 2012.

from the Meeting on April 5, 2016

President Liz Knapp called the meeting to order and welcomed new members and guests. Vice President Karen des Jardins, standing in for Tina Rounsavell, introduced Lorna Miser, the speaker for the program. Lorna told of her experiences in dyeing yarns and forming a business as a result. Her newest venture is Zombie Yarns.

Liz Knapp called upon various committee heads for announcements and reports:

1. Zita Gardner, membership, reported 298 members for 2016.

2. Mar Gee Farr was distributing the new Membership Directories and reminded the group that the general meetings for the rest of the year would be held at the Morgan Run Country Club and always on the first Tuesday of the month. Workshops will continue at the usual classroom site on the church grounds.

3. June Bertczak reminded those who were planning to attend the May Knitting Retreat that the final payment was due.

4. The librarians have removed the books from the church storage room to private storage places. Directions for borrowing and returning books are posted on the SDNCKG website.

5. Sue Tavaglione said she would arrange for MTM crocheting sessions if members were interested and would announce details soon.

6. Eileen Adler noted that the Share-a-Knit sessions have resulted in six dozen Knitted Knockers for Scripps Polster Center for Breast Cancer. Knitting directions are posted on the website.

7. Janet White, the new philanthropy chair, prepared a list of items that could be knitted for charities. She asked that the knitter roll and tie these individual items with a ribbon as a gift.

- a. Becky's House scarves for abused women.
- b. Emilie Nares Foundation soft hats to cover entire head for child Cancer patients.
- c. San Diego Youth Services Storefront scarves and hats (due in September and October).
- d. Rachel's Women's Center scarves and hats for holiday distribution also cosmetics, toiletries, etc.

8. The May program will include the general meeting presentation and four workshops by Patty Lyons.

9. The annual stash sale is planned for September. 10. Carol Myers, the County Fair Coordinator, has arranged for three days of demonstrations at the Fair, June 16, 19, and 23. She said that arrangements for the guild's awards would be for the Best Workmanship and Most Creative Design.

There were 139 persons attending this meeting. It was adjourned and the Show and Share Session followed.

loosely based on an Anny blatt pattern "Manteau a Capuche Abel," knit in Madelinetosh Pashmina Worsted. Mar Gee Farr coached Barbara through the embellishments, and will be teaching how in the May workshop.





Elizabeth Primrose-Smith wore her Hanky Tank top that she knit in Paton's 100% Cotton yarn that sh's had in her stash for ten years. The Joan Forgione pattern is from Knit.Purl Magazine Spring/ Summer 2015. Elizabeth

also showed **Joris**, a stuffed creature from designer Annita Wilschut. She used leftover acrylic yarn. *Learn to make Joris in a MTM class May* 25 (see MTM article).





Bobbie Brunson's Artist's Tee has a customized fit thanks to what she learned in designer Amy Herzog's"Knit to Flatter" Craftsy class. Bobbie used Knit Picks Lindy Chain, a 70% linen/30% cotton yarn. Read her notes on **Ravelry**.

z, ed a yarn. Iry. Irina Anikeeva designed the Aviara pullover as a seamless, bottom-up design with modified drop-shoulder sleeves. The twisted stitch cables give wonderful texture without adding bulk. Yarn used was Plucky Knitter Traveler Sport. Irina also showed more



twisted stitch cables in her **Cambre Fingerless Mitts**, which she made in Knit Picks Stroll sock yarn.

Colleen Davis used deep purples and greens for this **Freeform Vest**. Cables and short rows make this a oneof-a-kind original design.





Linda Hart knit two scarves inspired by the Vertices Unite pattern by Stephen West. By using various yarns from her stash, and working only half the stitches, Linda was able to modify a large shawl pattern into more wearable scarves for herself.

Liz Knapp knit **Scooter the Sea** Turtle for a friend's baby shower. She used Cleckheaton 100% Superwash DK. Her notes are **here**.





Josephine Barkhousen knit her Orenberg Shawl in 100% cashmere yarn with a border of 100% wool for a peasant look.

Marsha Wenskay knit another Stephen West pattern, <u>Garter</u> <u>Goodness</u>. She used several stashbuster yarns to get this striking combination:



Araucania Ulmo, hemp, and Newton's cotton yarns.



Sara Stolz knit the Neck Down Swing Coat from Knitting Pure and Simple in color #102 of Noro Kureyon 100% wool yarn. Sue Tavaglione's Aran Isles Cardigan is from designer Diane Zangl. She used Berroco Comfort worsted yarn. Sue noted that shaping is trickier when worked in seed stitch, especially on the sleeve cap. Nevertheless, the end result is lovely!





Susan Shock found the **Pfeilraupe Shawl** pattern on Ravelry, where it is available for free. She used Linaza yarn (50% alpaca/25% Tencel/ 25% linen) shich suits the pattern perfectly. Sue recommends reading the comments in other Ravelers' notes for helpful hints.

Sydnie Wauson was busy with lace and beads again. Her **Winter MKAL shawl** was designed by Susanna IC. Sydnie used Fibro fibers Fingering yarn and approx. 1,200 beads! She says this is a very customizable pattern with adjustments possible at the cast on, and in the size of the lace charts.



Vivian Forseth made the Dan Doh pattern **Jaunty** twice. The first one is in red (Cascade Alpaca Lace) and was knit by hand and Vivian didn't check her

gauge. Then Vivian knit the pattern a second time in green (Zen Garden Serenity lace) using her knitting machine. She knit the body on the machine, then picked up stitches and worked the sleeves by hand. You can see her notes on both versions on her **Ravelry** page.



Tania Marshall knit a Stephen West pattern called Smooth Move. She used three different Baah yarns: Aspen, Platinum, and La Jolla, and Hazel Knits Artisan Sock yarn as well.





• Read about a <u>Allbirds, New Zealand</u> company that is making 100% wool sneakers for men and women.

Clara Parkes reviewed them in her <u>Knitter's</u> <u>Review column</u>.

2 <u>Puka Puka Shawl</u> from Karen Melanson is a basic triangular shawl that opens up through bound off and cast on holes. It's simple but interesting and your yarn choice will make it uniquely yours. Free on Ravelry.

3 <u>Carioca</u> is a V-neck cardigan with threequarter-length sleeves and lace trim at the cuffs and hem. Berroco designed this piece to be knit flat and





seamed together. This construction allows the knitter to modify the shaping for the most personal and flattering fit.

 Chevron Baby Blanket from Espace Tricot uses 750 yds of worsted weight cotton and US 9 needles. Choose a modern palette or more traditional colorways for a sure-to-please baby gift.

Stripes and Lace Tunic from Kollage Yarns is a perfect pattern for San Diego's summer weather. It is knit in sport weight yarn on US #5 needles.

O Making Waves Dress #169-12 from DROPS Design is knit in six colors using a wave stitch. The seamless top-down construction forms a gentle A-line shape that you can try on as you knit. The DROPS BELLE yarn in the pattern is a DK weight blend of cotton, rayon and flax. Substitutions of silk, linen, hemp, bamboo or other plant-based fibers would work too.
